## National Education Policy (NEP) 2020

### CURRICULUM AND CREDIT FRAME WORK FOR UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAMMES

The National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 recognizes that higher education plays a crucial role in promoting human and societal well-being, and in developing India as envisioned in its Constitution—a democratic, just, socially conscious, and humane nation that upholds liberty, equality, fraternity, and justice for all. The NEP 2020 notes, "given the 21st-century requirements, quality higher education must aim to develop good, thoughtful, well-rounded, and creative individuals." In accordance with the NEP 2020, the UGC has formulated a new student-centric "Curriculum and Credit Framework for Undergraduate Programmes (UGC-CCFUGP 2022)" incorporating a flexible choice-based credit system, multidisciplinary approach, and multiple entry and exit options, which will facilitate students to pursue their career path by choosing the subject/field of their interest.

### OUTLINE OF NATIONAL EDUCATION POLICY

#### Programme Components

Towards the attainment of holistic and multidisciplinary education, the HEI/College will offer courses from every Department before the commencement of each semester, listing the courses for Major, Minors, Discipline-Specific Electives, Multidisciplinary Studies, Ability Enhancement, Skill Enhancement, and Value Addition, along with the offering departments and course in-charges. This will enable students to select the courses of their choice. The students will then choose the courses of their choice from the list being offered, taking into account the requirements outlined in the curriculum of the degree they are pursuing. The entire 3-year/4-year UG programme curriculum is divided into two parts: (a) Core Courses and (b) Common Courses, which are described below.

#### 1. Core Courses

The core courses comprise Discipline-Specific, Discipline-Specific Elective (DSE), and Minor courses. All core courses have a credit allocation of 4. Altogether, irrespective of any significant or minor options, a student will necessarily need to study 23 courses with a total credit allocation of 92 over a 3-year programme. The degrees relevant to the core courses will be awarded. The Central area of study chosen by the student. The major would provide the opportunity for a student to pursue an in-depth study of a particular subject or discipline.

a. Major Courses

Courses offered by a particular department for own students. The minimum credit requirement for a Single Core Discipline (Major) over 3 years is 64, which translates to 16 courses, including 5 DSEs.

b. Minor Courses

One of the Major courses offered by the Department shall be treated as a Minor for students of other departments. The department may also offer a separate course or repeat the same course(s) as a Minor for students of other departments. The minimum credit requirement for a Minor Course over 3 years is 24, which translates to 6 courses.

## 2. Common Courses

As the name suggests, these courses must be studied by all students in the 3-year or 4-year

undergraduate programme. Together, the common courses have a credit allocation of 36, divided over five subdivisions.

a. Multidisciplinary Courses (MDC): Total Credits 9

Courses offered by a particular department shall be considered multidisciplinary for students of other departments. A student cannot opt for an MDC catering to their Core Courses (Major and Minor). The student may opt for a different subject each semester. The course is designed to broaden the intellectual experience and is part of the liberal arts and science education, extending beyond the major and minor streams.

b. Ability Enhancement Course (AEC): Total Credits 8

Courses on Language and Communication Skills, viz. English, Hindi, and Sanskrit

c. Skill Enhancement Course (SEC): Total Credits 9

The HEI/College will identify the Skill Enhancement Courses to be offered in a semester, and students will choose the skill course of his/her choice from the courses offered.

d. I/A/P/C/ (or Work-based Vocational Course\*): Total credits 4

Internship/Apprenticeship/Minor Project/Community Outreach (I/A/P/C) or Work-based Vocational Courses are courses common to all students and will be carried out during the winter and summer terms/vacations. Although offered in the second semester, students can make their choice at the end of the first semester, allowing them to carry out activities during winter vacation as well.

e. Value-Addition Course (VAC): Total 6 Credits

These are the course(s) common to all students to be offered as a VAC category in a particular semester.

**A. A student will receive a certificate/diploma/degree upon exiting the HPU-UGP (depending on the year of graduation), provided they have passed all the minimum compulsory courses at that point in time.**

- B. After exiting, either at the end of Year 1 or Year 2, the student can seek entry on-ly into the same program to which they were initially admitted.**
- C. When a student exits the HPU-UGP after 3 years with a Bachelor's Degree, s/he cannot seek reentry into the programme in the fourth year; instead/they will need to take admission into the Master's programme in the first year.**
- D. Students with a UG degree with Honours after 4 years will have to take admis-sion into the second year of a 2-year Master's programme.**
- E. Students with a UG degree with Honours and Research after 4 years can directly progress to a PhD programme, provided they secure a minimum of 75% marks.**
- F. As the contents (syllabi) of all courses are subject to modification from time to time, when a student re-enters the programme after an earlier exit, they must study the content of all courses available at that time.**

### **Change of Programme**

The students who wish to change programmes in the 2nd year (or third semester) shall be eligible only for the 3-year B.A. programme (Multidisciplinary), subject to availability of seats and the Major programme in the College and earning of additional credits (8 each in each of the two core Major disciplines). Two courses of any one discipline studied in the first two semesters will be treated as a Minor. The remaining 16 credits shall be earned from a single Minor discipline.

### **Multiple Exits and Entries**

As permissible under UGC Guidelines for Multiple Entry and Exit in Academic Programmes offered in Higher Education Institutions, students will be allowed to enter/re-enter in the odd semesters and exit after even semesters, provided that they fulfil the minimum requirements for entry and exit.

The Multiple Entry and Exit policy shall also include students from other Universities and Colleges affiliated with other Universities who wish to join H.P. University or its affiliated colleges. The admission of such students shall be based on the merit of their score in the previous Semesters and availability of seats.

### **Migration**

Students pursuing their 3-year Undergraduate programme through the regular mode (i.e., a student from any college affiliated with H.P. University) can transfer their admission to CDOE at any point during a semester. Such a student, however, shall have to pay the complete Semester fee of the concerned semester as well, irrespective of the duration of the

semester gone by. Students pursuing their 3-year Undergraduate programme from CDOE can be migrated or admitted as regular students to colleges against vacant seats at the beginning of the semesters.

### **Inter-Institution Mobility**

The HPU-UGP enables students to engage in inter-institutional mobility, both for incoming and outgoing students. For this, HPU will take into account the credits that the student has in their ABC. For an incoming student, the following should be observed:

The entry is subject to the availability of seats in the concerned discipline.

The student must fulfil all the academic prerequisites of the relevant discipline.

HPU will award a degree to a student only when the student has completed at least 60% of the credits for core courses offered by HPU.

### **Option for Online Courses**

To achieve the three cardinal principles of India's Education Policy: Access, Equity, and Quality and for the benefit of students, options will be given for students to earn credit by completing quality-assured online programmes offered on the Study Webs of Active Learning for Young Aspiring Minds (SWAYAM: SWAYAM: [www.swayam.gov.in](http://www.swayam.gov.in)) or other online educational platforms approved by HPU as per the existing UGC regulations. Students may opt to earn credits from such courses up to 40 per cent of the total requirements, including I/A/P/C or work-based Vocational courses. (For details, see HPU SWAYAM Policy)

### **Attendance**

A student shall be eligible to appear in the end-semester examination only if he/she has a minimum of 75% attendance. The terms and rules governing condoning can be found in the Examination Section of the Ordinance.

### **Academic Bank of Credit (ABC)**

The Academic Bank of Credit (ABC) is a digital platform introduced under NEP 2020 that allows students to store and transfer academic credits earned from recognised higher education institutions. This system facilitates seamless credit transfer and supports flexible learning pathways. Credits stored in the Academic Bank of Credit are valid for up to seven years, providing students with the flexibility to resume their education even after taking a break.

**COURSES DETAILS THAT ARE RUNNING UNDER NEP (2020)  
(1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> Semester)**

### **(i) Choice Based Credit System (CBCS)**

Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) for UG Classes under Rashtriya Uchhatar Shiksha Abhiyan (RUSA) has been implemented w.e.f. session 2013-14, where the courses are measured in terms of credits. Credit is a method/unit to measure the volume of content, learning effort, achievement of learning and weightage of the course. The term credit refers to the weightage given to a course usually in terms of instructional hours per week assigned to it. For purpose of credit determination, one lecture or tutorial of one hour a week & practical of two hours a week is considered as one credit.

Himachal Pradesh University Shimla has implemented new CBCS as framed by UGC since the session 2016-17 in which the student is required to attain/secure 132 credits in three-year degree course or specified as per guidelines.

### **Outline of Choice Based Credit System**

#### **a) Core Course**

A course, which should compulsorily be studied by a candidate as a core requirement is termed as a core course.

#### **b) Elective Course:**

A course which can be chosen from a pool of courses and which may be very specific or specialized or advanced or supportive to the discipline/subject of study or which provides an extended scope or which enables an exposure to some other discipline/subject/domain or nurtures the candidate's proficiency/skill is called an elective course.

#### **(i) Discipline Specific Elective (DSE)**

Elective courses offered under the main discipline/subject of study are referred to as Discipline Specific Elective.

#### **(ii) Dissertation/Project**

An elective course designed to acquire special/advanced knowledge, such as supplement study/support study to a project work. A candidate studies such a course on his own with an advisory support by a teacher/faculty member is called dissertation/project.

#### **(iii) Elective (GE) Course**

An elective course chosen from related discipline/subject, with an intention to seek exposure beyond discipline/s of choice is called a Generic Elective.

Note: A core course offered in a discipline/subject may be treated as an elective by other discipline/subject and vice versa and such electives may also be referred to as Generic Elective.

#### **c) Ability Enhancement Course (AEC)**

The Ability Enhancement Course may be of two kinds: Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC) and Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC). "AECC" Courses are the courses based upon the content

that leads to knowledge enhancement. SEC courses are value-based and are aimed at providing hands on training, competencies, skills, etc.

**(i) Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC)**

These two courses are mandatory for all disciplines.

i) Environmental Science, ii) English Communication /Hindi Communication / MIL Communication.

**(ii) Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC)**

These courses may be chosen from a pool of courses designed to provide value-based knowledge and comprises both theory and lab/hands-on/training/fieldwork.

**d) Practical/Tutorials (one each with every core and discipline/generic specific elective paper)**

Introducing research component in Under-Graduate courses project work/dissertation is considered as a special course involving application of knowledge in solving/analysing/exploring a real situation/difficult problem.

A project/dissertation work would be of 6 credits. A Project/Dissertation work may be given in lieu of a discipline specific elective paper.

**Note:** Wherever a university requires that an applicant for a particular M.A./M.Sc./Technical/Professional course should have studied a specific discipline at the undergraduate level, it is suggested that obtaining 24 credits in the concerned discipline at the undergraduate level may be deemed sufficient to satisfy such a requirement for admission to the M.A./ M.Sc. / Technical/ Professional Course.

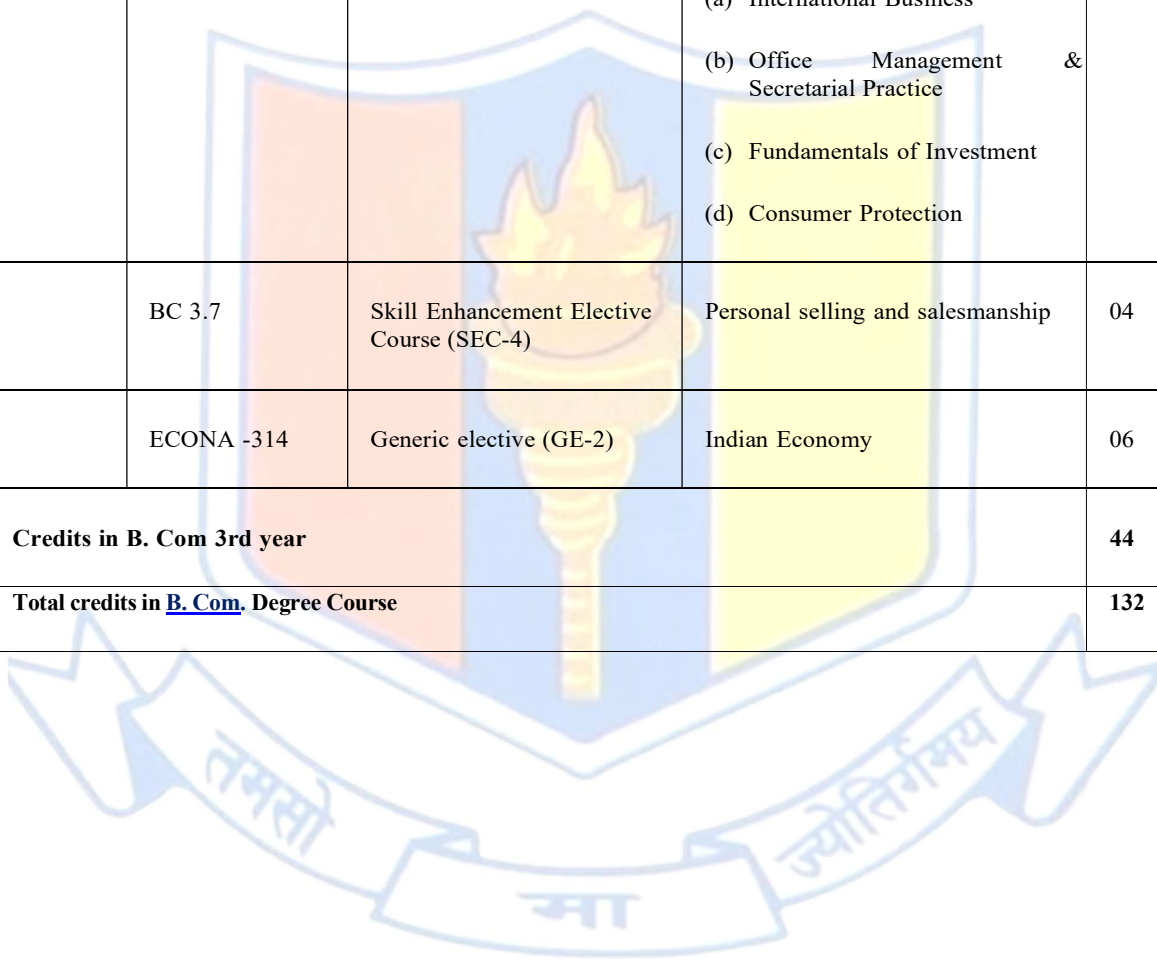

**Accumulation of credits**

A student enrolled in UGC (CBCS) will have to accumulate 132 credits for a bachelor's degree over a minimum of three and maximum of five years from the date of admission.

1. **Final examination of 70 marks of 3 hours duration covering the whole syllabus.**
2. **Continuous Comprehensive Assessment (CCA) of 30 marks**

**Continuous Comprehensive Assessment (CCA):** It will account to 30 marks which is further distributed as follows:

**a.) Classroom attendance**

A student has to attend a minimum of 75% lectures/tutorials and practical failing which he/she not be allowed to appear in ESE. The incentive for classroom attendance is:

75 % to 79%	1 mark	90 % to 94%	4 marks

**b.) Class Test and Mid-Term Test**

There will be one class test in each year of 5 marks and one mid-term test in each year of 10 marks to be conducted after completion of 75% of the syllabus. The papers will be set as per Himachal Pradesh University Shimla pattern and guidelines.

**c.) Seminar/Assignment/Term Paper**

The remaining 10 marks will be awarded on the basis of seminar/ Assignment/ term papers.

**Note:** Each student will have to secure at least 35 % marks in CCA to be eligible to appear in End Term Examination

## **Admission Rules for Under Graduate classes**

### **UG classes eligibility conditions**

A candidate will be eligible for admission to the First Year of B.A/ B.Com. / B.Sc. if he/she fulfils eligibility conditions prescribed by HPU subject to the amendments notified by the Himachal Pradesh University Shimla from time to time.

- i) A Candidate should have passed 10+2 examination conducted by H. P. Board of School Education or examination accepted as equivalent there by to the Himachal Pradesh University Shimla.**
- ii) The candidates who have passed the qualifying examination with science stream shall be given preference in admission to B.Sc. programme.**
- iii) The candidates who have passed the qualifying examination with commerce stream shall be given preference in admission to B.Com. programme.**

### **Compartment at +2 level**

A student placed under compartment in 10+2 class will not be eligible for admission in B.A./B. Com/B. Sc. 1<sup>st</sup> Year.

### **Upper age limit**

- i) For admission in 1st year the maximum age limit is 23 years for boys and 25 years for girl's candidates as on 1st July 2026.**
- ii) For SC/ST candidates a relaxation of three years in age is allowed. The Vice Chancellor may in exceptional circumstances, to be recorded in writing, give relaxation in age up to a maximum of six months.**

### **General admission rules**

- i) Admission will be made on the recommendation of admission committee.**
- ii) All admissions will be provisional subject to the approval of vice-chancellor, HPU Shimla.**
- iii) Admission will be strictly on the fulfilment of eligibility of candidate as fixed by HPU Shimla / HP Govt.**
- iv) A candidate seeking admission in any class of the college will be required to pay Rs. 500/- towards PTA fund. Fee & funds once deposited will not be refunded.**
- v) A candidate having a gap of one or more years in their studies will have to upload an affidavit explaining the reason.**
- vi) A candidate disqualified/expelled/rusticated from other institution/University will not be admitted to any course during his/her disqualification period.  
(HPU Shimla ordinance 3.6)**

- vii) **The principal reserves the right to disallow or cancel any admission if conduct of the student has not been up to the mark during previous years.**
- viii) **One supernumerary seat for single girl child candidate is reserved in each subject DSC1.**

#### **Change of subject combination/faculty & migration**

The change of subject (DSC-II or DSC-III) is permissible in the first year within fifteen days of admission. A request for change will have to be made to the principal on the prescribed forms available in the college office. After the recommendation of admission committee, change of DSC-II or DSC-III subject will be allowed only out of available subject combinations & seats in the subject.

#### **Migration**

- a) **A Candidate coming from Boards/Universities other than H.P. Board of school education/Himachal Pradesh University must produce Original Migration Certificate.**
- b) **Original migration certificate is to be uploaded with the HPU Shimla enrolment form.**
- c) **Candidate seeking migration from affiliated colleges of HPU Shimla shall have to apply on prescribed form.**

#### **ADMISSION PROCEDURE**

- a) **Every candidate seeking admission to 1<sup>st</sup> Year has to apply on the prescribed online registration portal on [www.gcbilaspur.in](http://www.gcbilaspur.in)**
- b) **Candidate has to deposit the printout of the online admission form along with the photocopies of requisite documents to college authority before the due date.**
- c) **A candidate seeking admission should personally appear before the concerned admission committee on prescribed dates along with original documents.**
- d) **The admission to first year of BA/B.Sc./B.Com in various programmes will be made through centralized counselling. Since the no. of seats in each DSC subject is limited, the admission will be made strictly on the basis of marks secured in 10+2 class. All the candidates are required to appear in person in centralized counselling on the dates allotted failing which their admission form will be rejected and the seat will be given to the next candidate in the merit.**
- e) **After the allotment of subject by the Centralized Counselling Committee, the admission form will be forwarded to the concerned subject committee which will finalize the admission of the student.**

#### **Admission process for B.A./B.Com./B.Sc. 2<sup>nd</sup> & 3<sup>rd</sup> Year**

For admission to 2<sup>nd</sup> Year & 3<sup>rd</sup> year Roll on system will be applicable. The students of this college who have appeared in 1<sup>st</sup> Year & 2<sup>nd</sup> Year examination will have to take admission in the

next year through online admission mode without waiting for result before the last date of admission. No candidate will be admitted in the college after the specified date of admission schedule. Every candidate seeking admission to 2<sup>nd</sup> Year and 3<sup>rd</sup> Year shall apply online on <http://www.gcbilaspur.in> on the prescribed form available in the online registration portal.

## **ADMISSION RULES FOR POST GRADUATE CLASSES**

There will be common entrance test conducted by Himachal Pradesh University Shimla as per notified schedule. The admission will be made on the basis of marks obtained in the entrance test. All the candidates seeking admission to M. A./M.Com. /M. Sc. will have to apply to Himachal Pradesh University Shimla before last date specified. After the declaration of result of entrance test the applicants must present themselves for the verification of original documents on the counselling date and time fixed by the college. The list of selected candidates will be displayed on the notice board. Selected candidates will have to deposit their dues within the notified time failing which the admission will stand cancelled and the vacant seats will be allotted to the next in the merit list.

### **Eligibility for M. A. (Economics, English), M.Com. & M. Sc. (Physics, Chemistry & Mathematics)**

Bachelor degree with 48 credits in the subject in which admission is sought.

OR

A Bachelor's Degree of a University established by law in India (with the subject of study for M.A./M.Sc. as one of the subject) with a minimum of 48 credits in major subjects, 48 credits in two minor subjects, 9 credits in compulsory, 1 credit in GI & hobby with aggregate of 106 credits for the award of pass degree. In addition to this the minimum eligibility for admission to Post graduate course will be 20-24 credits in the subject concerned in the undergraduate degree.

**8.40 (Ord.) Note:** A candidate who appears in the examination of first semester and fails to obtain pass marks in any course may be permitted to proceed from first semester to but he/she shall be permitted to proceed from first semester to second semester without appearing in first semester by paying the fee as prescribed by the authority from time to time. It will be applicable in all semesters i.e. second to third, third to fourth and fourth to first where students sought admission directly in second semester.

### **Basis of admission**

The admission of the above courses will be made strictly on the basis of marks obtained in the entrance test.

Note: For Post Graduate classes the maximum age limit is 26 years for male candidates and 28 years for female candidates.

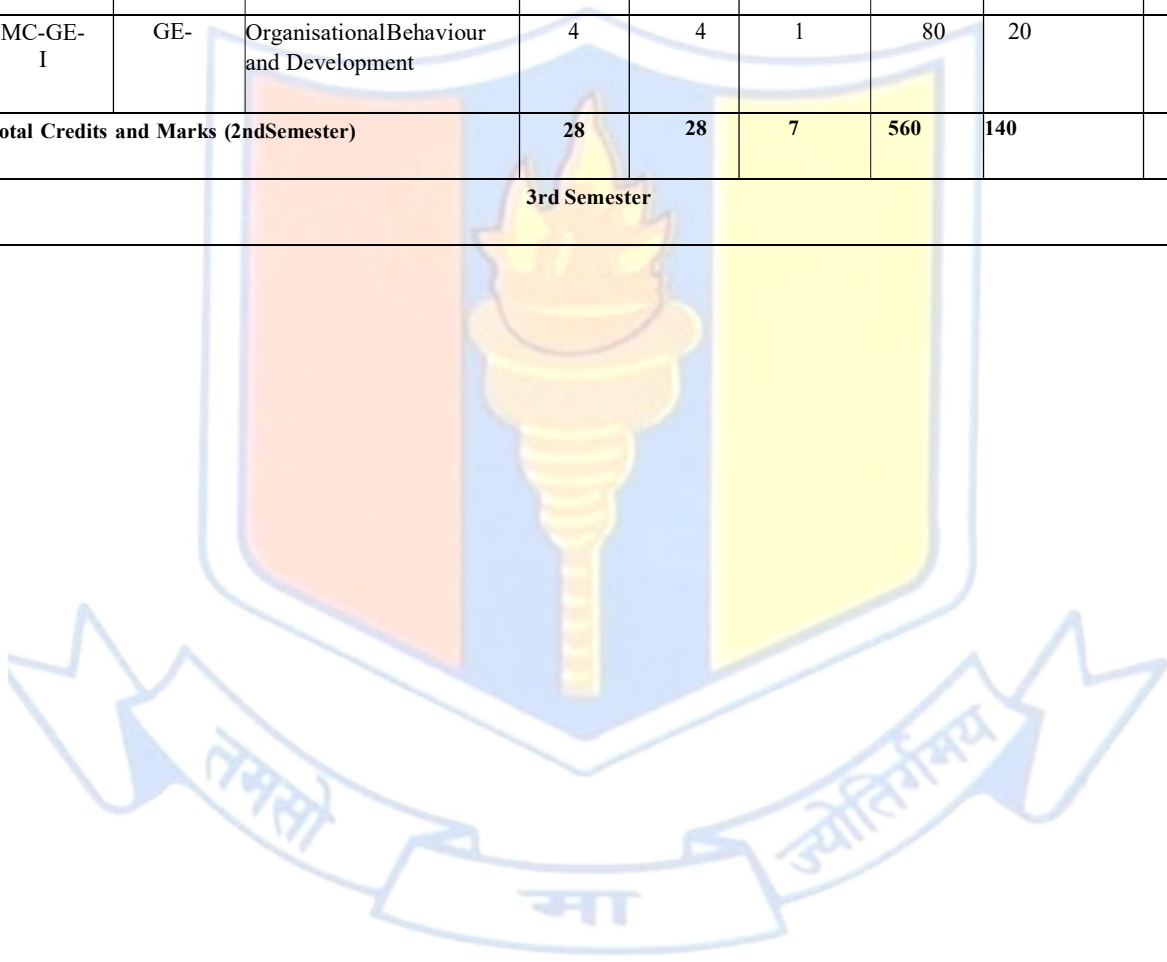

University, Shimla. In order to maintain quality and parity of the program the panel of examiners for conducting Viva-Voce will be approved by the competent authority on the recommended of the Chairman Department of Commerce.

### Admission and Reservation Ordinance

*Admission shall be open to all persons irrespective of race, creed, caste, or class subject to the following condition:*

### **Identity cum library card**

*Every student will be issued an Identity Card which can be downloaded by the students from the link provided by the college authority. Students are required to carry Identity Card in campus and have to produce as and when demanded by college authority. In case the card is lost, a duplicate card will be issued only after a written request and depositing Rs. 20/-. The students will be responsible if his/her card is misused in bus pass, library or for any other activities.*

### **Library**

*The college has a well-stocked automated library and periodical section/reading room. The library subscribes to 13 newspapers, 27 magazine and 6 Journals. Besides that the college library is also equipped with INFLIBNET technology, which provides the students the facility to access the free online E-Books, E-Journals and E-Magazines. A separate cabin with 6 computers with Wi-Fi connectivity is also available in the library. All the books in the library have been entered in the SOUL Software 3.0. Currently 35,020 books on different subjects are available in the library.*

*Student library card can be downloaded by students from the link provided by the college to them and will be verified by the college committee.*

### **Library rules**

- 1. Reference books are not issued. These can be consulted in the library after obtaining permission from the librarian.**
- 2. A maximum of two books will be issued to a student at a time.**
- 3. Books are issued for twenty days. If the books are not returned within due date a fine of Rs. 1/- per book per day will be charged.**
- 4. If a student mutilates or defaces a book - a fine and the cost of the book will have to be deposited.**

### **Leave Rules**

1. **Students have to apply for leave in writing.**
2. **Concerned subject teacher can sanction/recommend leave for three days.**
3. **For more than 3 days the senior tutor will sanction the leave.**
4. **In case of illness lasting more than 6 days the medical certificate from the doctor will have to be submitted.**
5. **A student who remains absent without leave for more than 10 days his/her name will be struck off from the attendance register. In that case the student will have to seek re-admission within seven working days.**
6. **The application must be signed by the applicant himself/herself and the applicant must ensure that the concerned subject teacher has noted down the leave.**
7. **A student whose name has been struck off twice will not be eligible for re-admission.**
8. **Students who represent college in various inter-college games or other competitions will have to get their leave sanctioned and noted by the subject teachers before their departure for the event.**
9. **Leave during house examination will be sanctioned by the Principal after the recommendation of the concerned subject teacher in special cases only.**
10. **There will be no fine for the leave period, but the students will have to fulfill the condition of 75 % lecture attendance in whole academic session.**

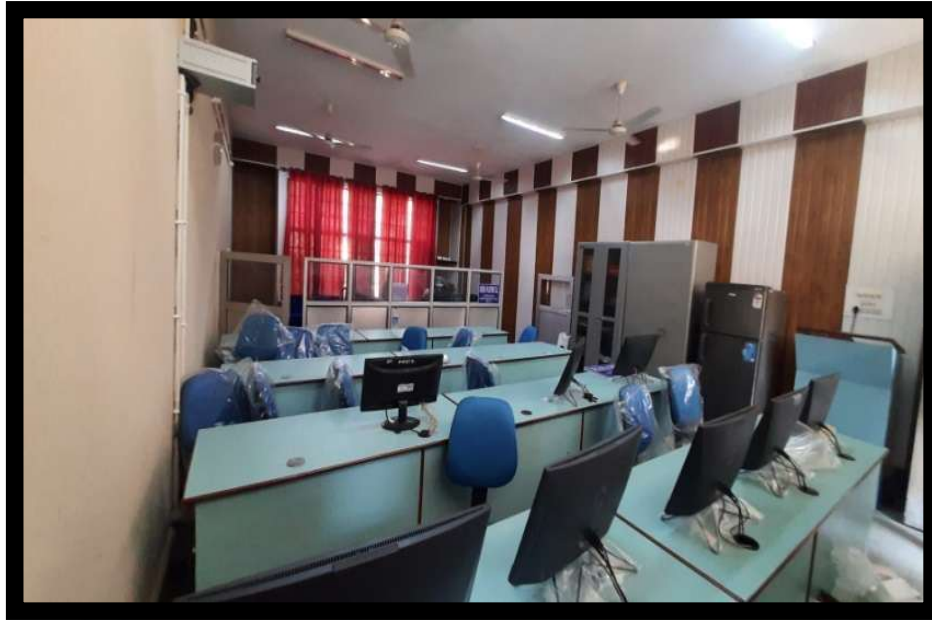

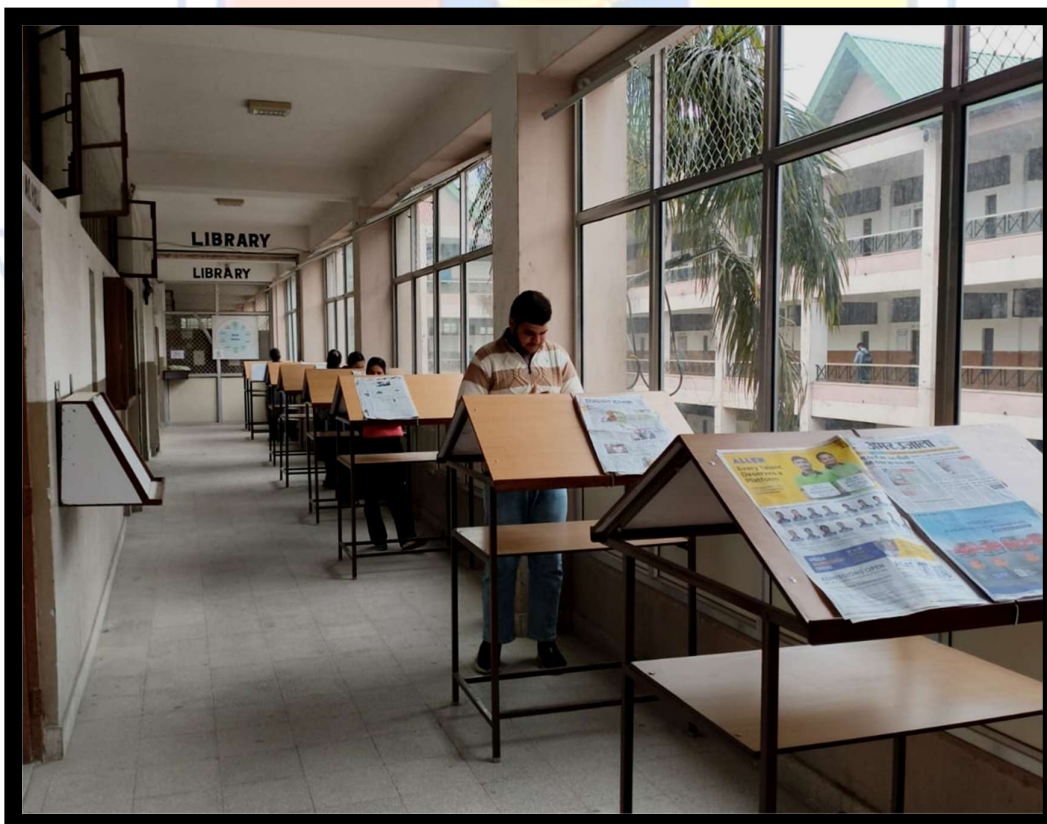

1. To provide multiple entry and exit options at various levels through program design in conformation to the skill eco system.
2. To create requisite job specific skilled manpower for industry at various NSQF levels as per NOS's (National Occupational Standards).
3. To empower the youth leads to employment and income generating opportunities.
4. To provide judicious mix of skills relating to a profession and appropriate content of general education.
5. To integrate skill based NSQF vocational studies with the undergraduate level of higher education in order to enhance employability of the graduates and meet the industry requirements. Such graduates apart from meeting the needs of local and national industry are also expected to be competent to become part of the global workforce.

### Course structure

B. Voc. programme is designed with the provision for multiple exit levels. All the candidates enrolled for diploma courses or further will be treated at par from the second semester onwards. Students may exit after six months with the certificate (NSQF Level 4) or they may continue for diploma or advance diploma level courses leading to B. Voc. Degree

### Multiple entry and exit options:

1. After the completion of semester I, the candidate will get a certificate, and she/he may go for a job or continue studying.
2. The candidate may rejoin semester II. After the completion of semester II, the candidate will get a Diploma, and she/he may go for a job or continue studying.
3. The candidate may rejoin semester III. After the completion of semesters III and IV, the candidate will get an Advanced Diploma, and she/he may go for a job or continue studying.

4. The candidate may rejoin semester V. After the completion of semesters V and VI, the candidate will be awarded a B. Voc. degree, and she/he may go for a job or become an entrepreneur, or continue studying for the M. Voc. Degree (NSQF Level 8 onwards). Candidate can register for Ph.D. degree (NSQF Level 10) after it in Vocational studies, or they can take admission in any other masters' programme after completion of required bridge course, or appear in any competitive exams conducted by State Public Service Commission and Union Public Service Commission.

### **On Job Training Programme**

1. In every level there will be internship at the end of the semester / Year. Internship is an integral /essential component of B. Voc. degree.
2. The Internship shall also carry credits to be added in the final evaluation of skill components.
3. Candidates enrolled for this programme are entitled for ' Kaushal Vikas Bhatta' of Rs. 1000/- per month as per state Government guidelines.

### **Eligibility conditions**

1. Admission to the B. Voc. Programme will be as per the rules and regulations of the Himachal Pradesh University Shimla.
2. The eligibility criteria for admission to the B. Voc. degree Programme shall be 10+2 in all streams from a recognized board; 10+2 examination or an examination equivalent thereof from a Board/University established by law in India with English as a compulsory subject with 45 marks in aggregate, OR any examination of a University/ Board/ College or School in a foreign country recognized as equivalent for the above purpose by the Vice-Chancellor/Equivalence Committee on its own, OR on the recommendation of Association of India Universities with 45 marks OR as per eligibility norms of the college for admission to undergraduate courses in case of center of excellence.
3. Vocational subjects under NSQF will be given weightage, equivalent to any other general education subject while considering admission to students to the undergraduate courses as per reference no. DDNo. 1- 52/2013(CC/NSQF) dated 30.04.2014 of UGC.
4. Maximum age limit for admission to B. Voc. courses is 23 years for general category, 25 years for SC/ST category and 25 years for girl candidates, as on July 1 of the admission year. The Vice Chancellor may permit age relaxation as per norms.
5. Reservation rules are applicable as per the rules or guidelines of the Himachal Pradesh Government.
6. Students belongs to SC/ST category shall be given a relaxation in marks for admission purpose, i.e., they would require a minimum of marks in aggregate at 10+2 level.
7. Compartment students shall not be allowed to take admission in the B. Voc. Programmes.
8. A candidate cannot pursue two full time undergraduate courses simultaneously.

9. The University reserves the right to cancel any admission at any stage.
10. In matters relating to undergraduate admissions, the decision of the Admission Committee/Vice-Chancellor, Himachal Pradesh University, Shimla, shall be final.
11. All legal matters pertaining to undergraduate admissions shall be subject to the Himachal Pradesh jurisdiction only.

### **Mode of Selection**

1. Admission to the B.Voc. Programme in Retail Management and Hospitality & Tourism (Semester-I) shall be done purely on the merit in the qualifying examination (10+2 etc.).
2. There are three categories of candidates who shall be given admission in semester-I of the skill-based courses under NSQF.

**Category 1:** Students who have already acquired NSQF certification Level 4 in a particular Industry sector may opt for admission in the skill-based courses under NSQF.

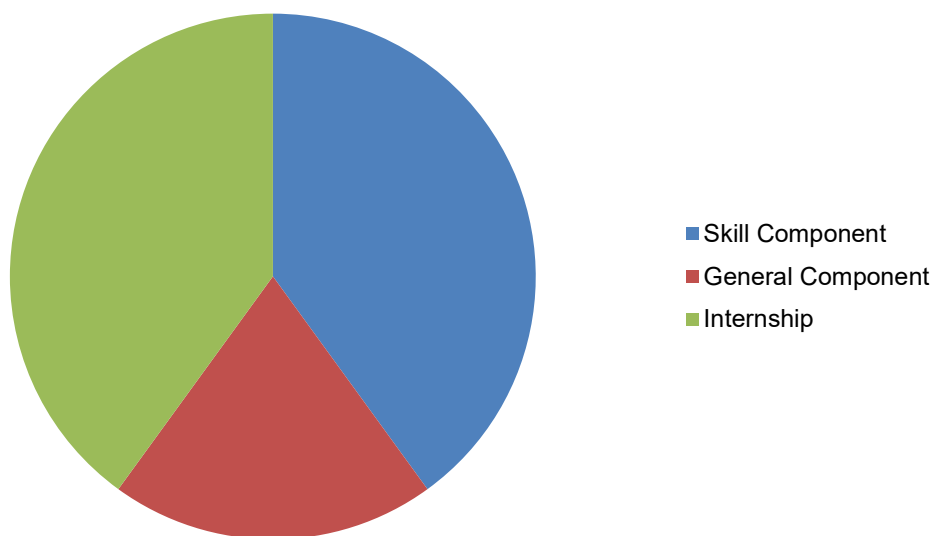
**Category 2:** Students who have acquired NSQF certification Level 4, but may like to change their trade and enter into skill-based courses in a different trade.

**Category 3:** Students who have passed the 10+2 examination with conventional schooling without any background of vocational training.

**Note:** Regarding selection of students for B. Voc. Programme, 10 extra weightage shall be given to Category-1; 5 extra weightage shall be given to Category-2 in 10+2 examination. Final list of students shall be finalized on merit.

**Medium of instructions:** The course content of the B. Voc. Programme will be taught in English medium.

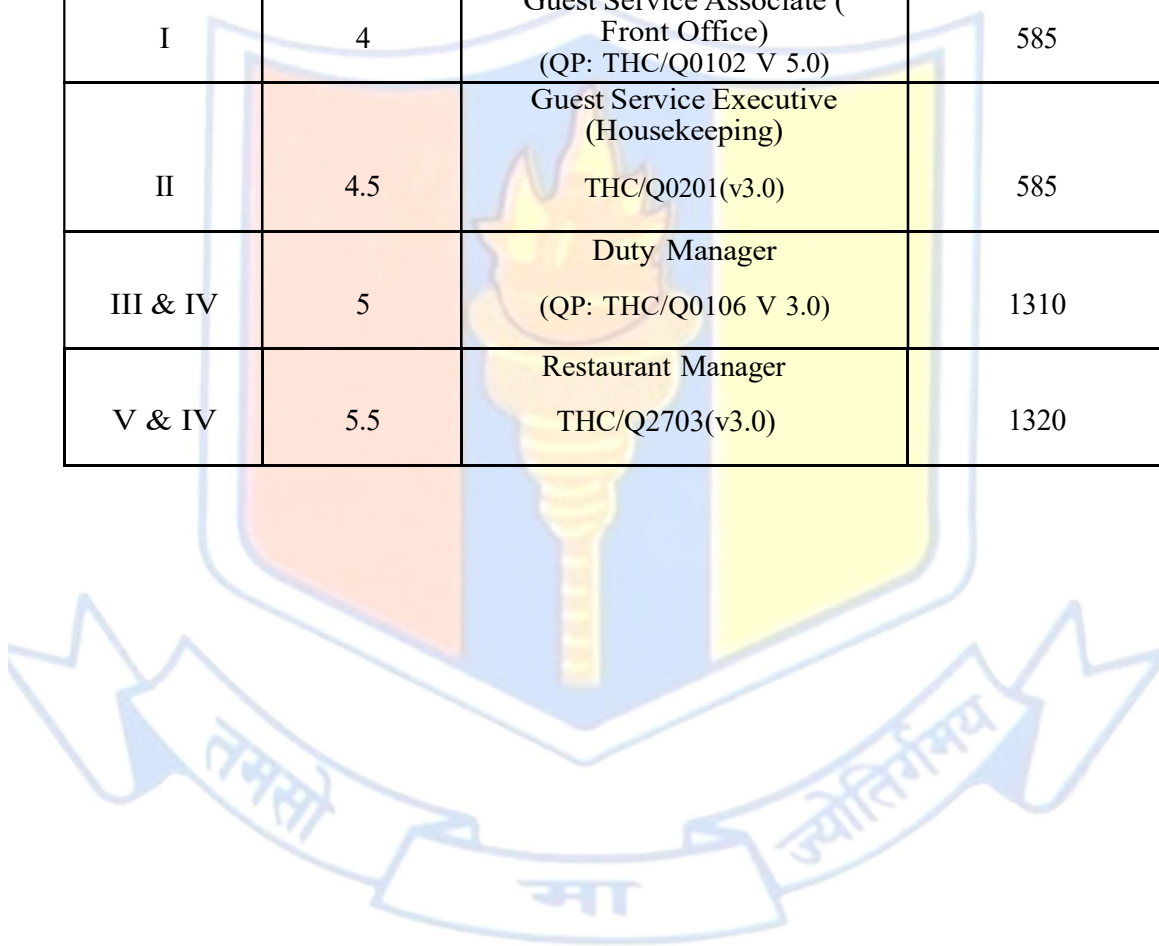

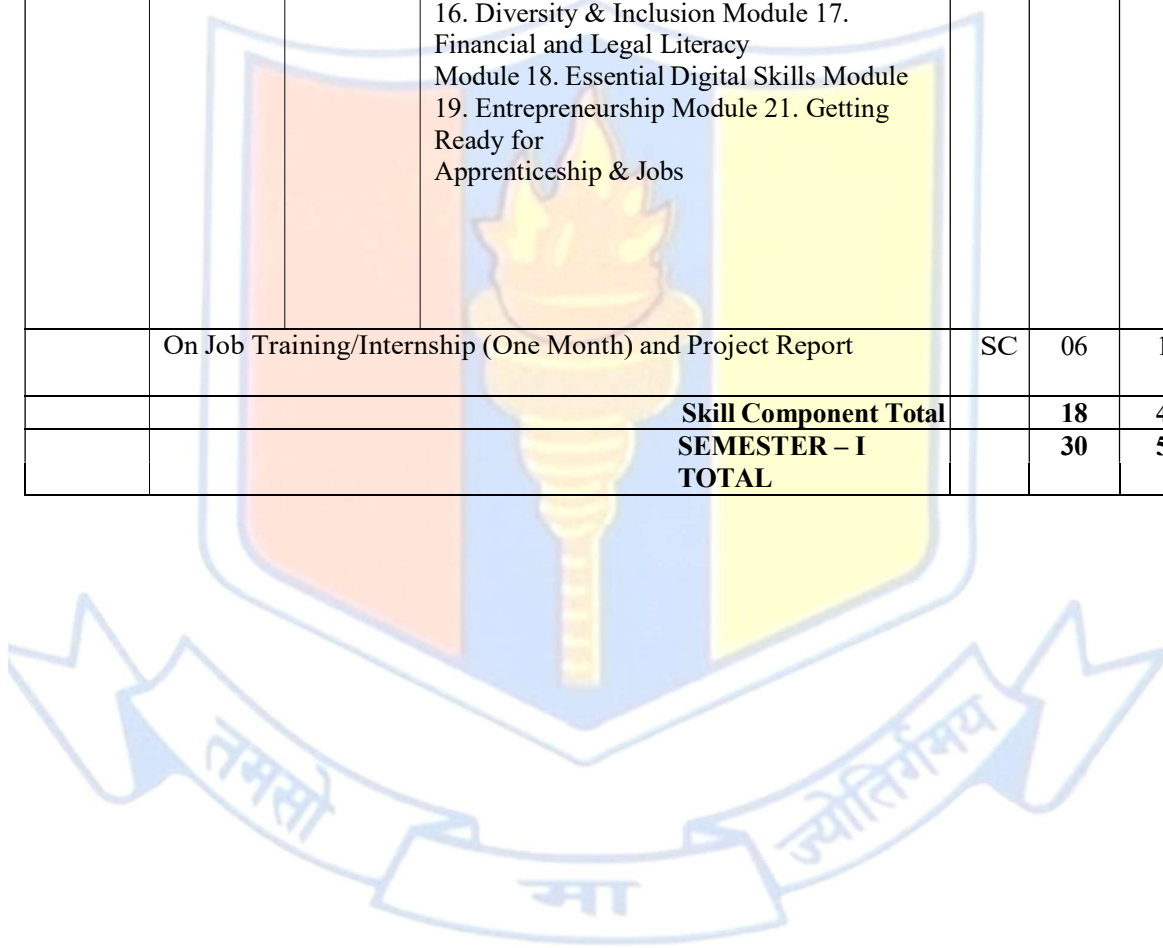

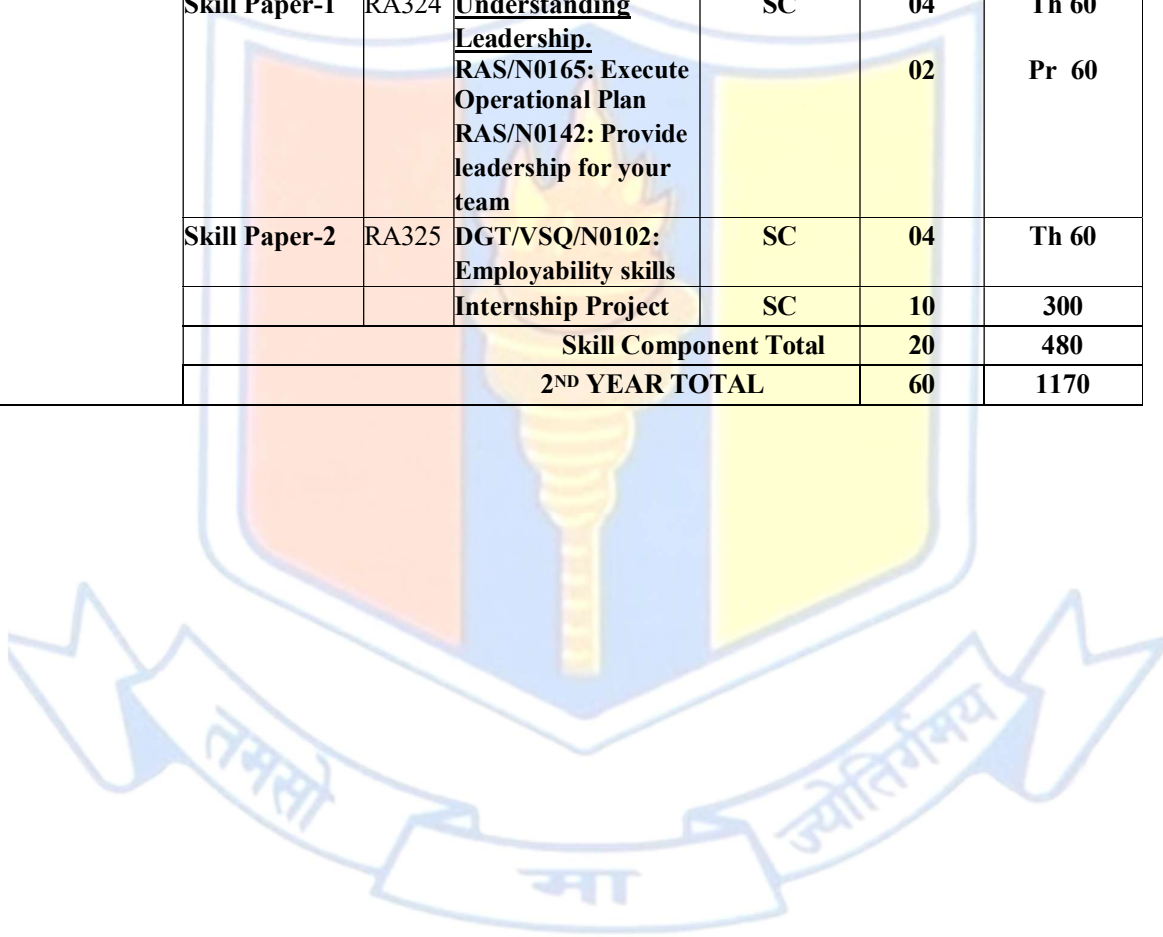
